Note: The list of officers from March 1699 and that of March 1700 differ significantly on one lieutenant and one cornet. No clear explanation could be found, other than that the officers indicated in *italics* vacated their place in lieu of the officers listed next.

The Royal Regiment of Dragoons has its origin in a troop of horse raised in 1661 for service at Tangier. In 1684 there were four troops of horse in Tangier. Two troops of dragoons were raised in England in November 1683. In 1684 the four Tangier troops were repatriated and converted to dragoons subsequently. These six troops were united as The King's Own Royal Regiment of Dragoons (named for Charles II). The regiment was redesignated the Royal Regiment of Dragoons in 1690. The regiment served in Ireland between 1689 and 1691, and in the Low Countries from May 1694.

This regiment was raised on 2 August 1685 as The Queen Consort's Regiment of Dragoons (the designation Queen's Regiment is also found in literature). The regiment was formed from troops reduced from the Royal Regiment of Dragoons and Princess Anne of Denmark's Regiment of Dragoons. The Royal designation was not used between 1689 and 1692 - 94 (when the regiment was named after Queen Mary). The regiment was composed of six troops, and two additional troops were added in February 1694. The regiment served in the major campaigns in Ireland, and in the Low Countries from April 1694. The regiment surrendered to the French at Diksmuide on 18 July 1695, and was exchanged later that year (see table 7.1).

The Earl of Essex's Regiment was raised on 17 July 1685 as The Princess Anne of Denmark's Regiment of Dragoons (named for the future Queen Anne). The designation Princess Anne of Denmark's Regiment fell into disuse after 1689, so the regiment became known by the name of its colonel. The regiment served in Scotland in 1689, and embarked for service in the Low Countries in early 1692. The regiment was composed of six troops, and two additional troops were added in February 1694. Two troops were reduced in March 1699. By August 1700, the regiment had become part of the Irish Establishment.
